Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) can clog sewer pipes leading to sewage back-ups in kitchens, and sanitary sewer overflows where untreated sewage flows in the streets and through storm drains directly to surface waters. FOG also damages aging infrastructure.

FOG is a major contributor to municipal wastewater (sewer) collection system blockages and backups. The USEPA estimates that FOG causes just over 50% of all sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs).
